## **Lloyd Library and Museum Announces Extended Hours Effective September 18, 2004**



The Lloyd Library and Museum is pleased to announce extended hours. Effective September 18, 2004, the Library will be open third Saturdays of each month during the academic year, September-May, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Saturday hours will enable the library to serve patrons and researchers who are unable to visit during the regular work week hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Friday. The extended hours will also provide opportunities for the general public interested in exploring Cincinnati's cultural offerings to visit a unique, world-class library whose holdings include a vast array of rare books containing exquisite botanical illustrations and historical information on medicinal botany, pharmacy, alternative medicine, gardening, and more. The library makes such material available for viewing through its changing exhibits program. Each quarter, January through March, April through June, July through September, and October through December, library staff installs an exhibit in the reading room devoted to a topic covered by the Lloyd's collections and illustrated with rare books and historical texts. Press releases for new exhibits, lectures, and

other events will be issued.

The [Lloyd Library and Museum](http://www.lloydlibrary.com), located at 917 Plum Street, downtown Cincinnati, is a local and regional treasure. The library was developed in the nineteenth century by the Lloyd Brothers-John Uri, Curtis Gates, and Nelson Ashley. Incorporated in 1898, its original purpose was to provide a reference and research facility for Lloyd Brothers Pharmacists, Inc., one of the leading pharmaceutical companies of the period. A trust was established in 1919 to guarantee that the library would continue to fulfill its mission "to collect and maintain a library on botanical, medical, pharmaceutical, and scientific books and periodicals and works of allied sciences" into the future. The library's operations are still supported by that trust and today, the Lloyd Library and Museum is recognized worldwide by the scientific community as a vital research center. Housing hundreds of thousands of volumes on the subjects of pharmacy, botany, horticulture, herbal and alternative medicines, natural products, homeopathy, and eclectic medicine, the Lloyd maintains a vast collection of scientific texts-from the most current works to those that date back hundreds of years. Included in this rare book collection is an original copy of the ten-volume *Flora Graeca* (1840) by John Sibthorp, an original copy of Elizabeth Blackwell's *A Curious Herbal* (1739), *Mesue Vulgare* (a 1493 "common book" of remedies), and an array of rare European texts from the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. The Lloyd also houses archival collections, including the papers of John Uri Lloyd, Curtis Gates Lloyd, Lloyd Brothers Pharmacists, Inc., and the Eclectic Medical College of Cincinnati.
